The College Academic Council and the individual departments with close collaboration from external experts and responding to the needs of the stakeholders and job availability, proposes alterations in the curriculum. This provides opportunities for all stakeholders to have a say in the curriculum designing exercise since they are all an integral part of the Academic Council. The College is the first in the University to adopt CBCS system at the Under Graduate level for B.Com, BBA, BCA, BSW & B.Voc as these subjects do not have three major systems as in BA & B.Sc. The College is working out to implement the CBCS for BA and B.Sc courses also in the Second Cycle.

To enhance writing as well as communication skills it was decided to have a single project work and presentation per semester. To give more weightage for IA Written Test, it was decided to increase marks from 20 to 40.

1.5 Any new Department/Centre introduced during the year. If yes, give details.

Two new departments in UG namely Philosophy and Holistic Spirituality were started. And two new departments in PG M.A in Holistic Spirituality, Sociology were started. Under the scheme of B.Voc Degree Programme, the college started two programmes namely **B.Voc in Healthcare Technology** and **B.Voc in Media and Entertainment**. The University Grants Commission (UGC) has sanctioned Rs. 1.70 crore to the college for the new Bachelor of Vocation (B. Voc.) degree programme. A separate department/centre is created to oversee the functioning of these programmes.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The College has always been dedicated to promoting learner-centric processes. Technology aided teaching has helped in harnessing student involvement in learning processes. The faculty members have access to e-content/e-resources available in the library for classroom teaching. In a few multimedia equipped Lecture halls the faculty can demonstrate the various multimedia content available in the digital library through virtualized CDs & DVDs.

The Arts and Commerce departments have special BLOGS to interact with students. BLOGS consists of Special Articles, Objective type question bank and Notes. In our college website provision is made for a teacher to send bulk e-mail and SMS's to the students for respective classes, where teacher can interact with students in allotting assignments and discussions. The college has established a Language Lab with nine computers and a trained teacher to facilitate students to improve their accent and English Grammar.

The chalk and talk have been minimized as ICT facilities can empower a teacher to deploy all the resources available online for classroom use. During this period the students have had number of opportunities to learn from exclusive materials and teaching aids available on CDs and DVDs which can be played in classrooms. Plays/ novels taught in English classrooms have been complemented by film versions.

To enhance writing as well as communication skills it was decided to have a single project work and presentation per semester. The IBM SPSS statistical package brought by the college has helped the teachers who are doing research in Humanities, social work and commerce to convert the data they have collected to effective research presentations

4.2 Computerization of administration and library

St. Philomena's College Library can feel legitimately proud of itself since it has nearly 42,375 books and subscribes to over 71 print journals and magazines on various topics. Apart from this, the library has a growing section on digital learning resources in the form of CDs and DVDs (nearly 200). The Library uses Easylib software, an entire automation system for library, to manage all its resources and services Reference Section has several Encyclopedias, Year Books, Dictionaries and books on General Knowledge. In order to enrich the library number of valuable books on varied topics of study and interests are added every year. The Library has a well arranged stack floor and a spacious mezzanine floor where books and journals are kept for the staff and students. The library is kept open between 8:30am to 5:00pm on all working days. The Library has imbibed the latest technology and increased its e-resources collection. It is member to the UGC E-resources project namely, N-LIST of the INFLIBNET Centre. The N-LIST Project provides full text access to more than 6,000 e-journals and 90,000 e-books to students, faculty and researchers. The digital collection of the central library has been consolidated by the state of the art Techfouz Digital Library4.02 from Focuz Infotech. It is an high performance, highly sophisticated CD/DVD mirror server solution designed to share CD/DVD based information simultaneously and effectively.

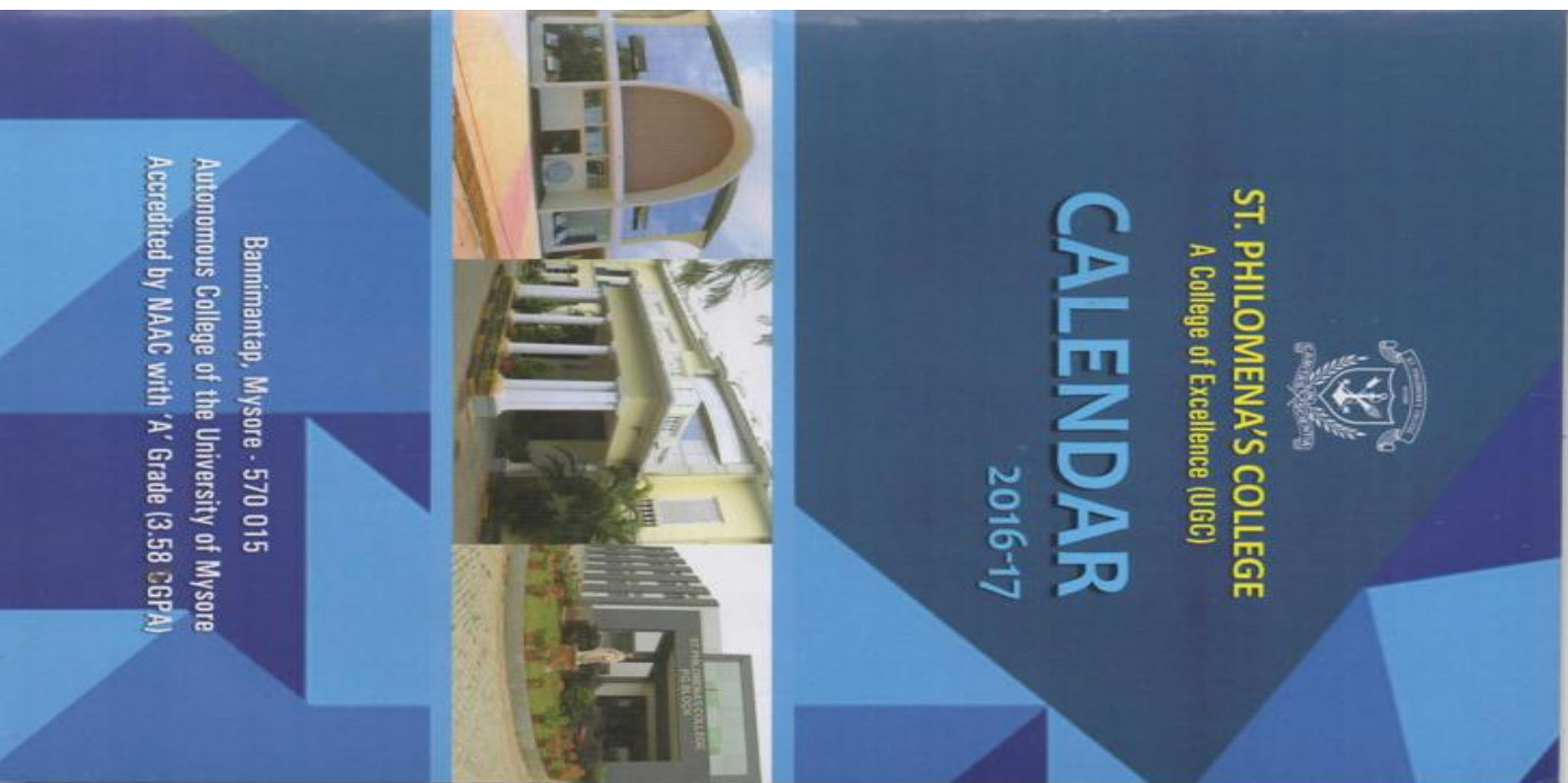

THE COMMON PURSUIT

Parents and Guardians

The institution holds the dream of improving the lives of students who seek admission. It is also aware of the enormous responsibility that it bears and is conscious of the expectations that are held by its stakeholders. It is in this awareness that springs the need for collaborative strategies. The students and parents / guardians are essential stakeholders need to converge and concur on critical issues in order to build possibilities of an assured future. Hence, it calls for a strong plinth to work from. We appreciate interventions from parents or guardians as and when necessary and propose to build a strong partnership.

Faculty

Persons of merit and experience along with an emerging teaching fraternity hold office with a steadfast concern for education. The faculty is enlightened about its duties and apart from dispensing regular academic responsibilities it grants assistance in counseling and mentoring. Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular events and offered necessary guidance by the faculty. Exclusive attention is accorded to students who require professional counsel. Parental interventions are sought as and when the need arises. An engaging commitment to quality service is mooted by the College.

Library

The Central Library on the campus is equipped with wide-ranging resources, both print and digital. It is a member of the N-List project supported by Infibnet Centre, Ahmedabad which affords an access to numerous research and reviewed journals across the streams.

Books may be borrowed on all working days. A Reading Room and Reference Section is also open to students during the working hours. The adjoining section houses the UGC- Resource Network Centre enabled with Computers and Internet connectivity. Reprographic facility is also made available at the library.

Extra-curricular Activities

There is no students' union in the college. A majority of the students have suggested during the orientation programme conducted at the beginning of the Academic Year that more sports, library and cultural programmes should be conducted for all students and more students should be involved. Students who volunteer will constitute various committees through which these programmes will be conducted.

Lady students should kindly note, that no college function is compulsory after 5 p.m. Parents and Guardians of lady students should ensure that their children/wards don't stay out late under the pretext of college extracurricular activities.

Excursion and Picnics

Generally, the college does not organize any excursions or picnics. Students are forbidden to organize excursions or picnics, without explicit permission from the Principal. Under no circumstances, any excursion, or study tours involving lady students will be permitted unless a senior lady member of the staff accompanies the group.

Sports and Games

We encourage sports and games as per the guidelines given by the Government/University. With special grants from the UGC, a state-of-the-art Indoor Stadium was established. The Director of Physical Education with the assistance of other teachers organizes the Annual Athletic Meet and a number of inter-house competitions. Selections will be made for various college teams and interested students will be trained. It is a matter of pride for all of us, that every year a sizeable number of our students are selected for the University Teams. Please note, sports and games are scheduled after the class hours.

Attendance

for all students to attend classes regularly. As per the University Guidelines and also court directives, students who do not attend 75% of the total classes held, cannot appear for the end-semester exams. They will have to repeat the semester. Attendance is updated on a daily basis. All students should take care that they attend the classes regularly. Parents and guardians are expected to keep track of the attendance.

Dress

Ours has been a co-education college from the very beginning. We have students from more than 20 states of India and 19 different countries. In spite of diverse cultures, students should respect the local customs. It is mandatory for all students to dress modestly. Whenever there is violation of dress code, students will be warned by any member of the faculty. If they repeat, they will be asked to seek admission elsewhere.

Tests and Exams

In every semester, there will be an Internal Assessment Test for 40 marks. The students will have to submit assignments for every subject. Besides these, there will be marks for seminars, attendance, projects etc. The Internal Assessment marks are counted for declaring the results of each semester. Students should take the test, assignments, seminars, academic quiz held in the class etc. There is no provision for Internal Assessment marks to be brought forward.

Reports

Teachers feed attendance to the computer on daily basis. Students can check their attendance reports swiping their smart ID cards at the computer kept in the reception. Monthly attendance reports will be displayed on the notice board and reports will be sent to the parents/guardians from time to time. Parents are advised to keep track of the attendance to ensure that they have the required percentage. Those who do not get the required percentage will not be permitted to appear for the final examination.

Identity Card

This is the only way to curb the anti-social elements from entering the College campus.

Scholarships and Freshships

Students who wish to claim categories such as SC/ST, minorities, differently abled and other reserved categories can avail information at a section dedicated to related issues at the office. Applications will be forwarded by the College office to the concerned Government Departments. Scholarship/Freshship amount will be transferred directly to the SB accounts of the student by the respective Government Departments.

Certificates

Students should apply for various certificates like Bona Fide Certificate, Study Certificate, T.C etc. in the prescribed form available in the office. Certificate will be issued on the following working day. Please do not demand for these certificates on the same day you submit the application.

Vehicles

Students who bring two wheelers to the College should pay the prescribed fee to the College office and obtain a pass to park the vehicles in the cycle/scooter stand. To foster the faith formation of the Catholic students, the College offers the following activities: Jesus Youth Group, Bible Study Group and AICUF. The members of the above group meet once a week. These meetings are geared towards developing and strengthening Christian ideals, leadership and deepen their spirituality.

Eucharistic Celebration

At the beginning of each year an Inaugural Mass is celebrated. Besides Eucharistic celebrations on various occasions, a Thanksgiving Mass is also offered at the end of the academic year.

The Annual Retreat

Opportunities are provided for Catholic students to make a retreat during the course of the academic year. All Catholic students are expected to attend the retreat.

Religious Instruction Classes

All Catholic students should attend the religious instruction classes conducted regularly.

College wants students to adhere to all rules and regulations intended to benefit the institution as well as the individual student.

- ☞ Students should wear the Identity Card while on campus. The card should be shown to any member of the Staff or College Officials when asked for, especially when dealing with the Office and Library.
- ☞ The bell for class is given five minutes before the commencement of classes. Students should be in their respective class rooms before the second bell.
- ☞ Students should maintain complete silence in the corridors during class hours. Students must not crowd the corridors during class hours or otherwise.
- ☞ No student is allowed to leave the lecture hall without the teacher's permission or until the class is dismissed.
- ☞ If the concerned teacher is on leave, students should go to the library.
- ☞ Students must observe punctuality. At the discretion of the teacher a student may be permitted to enter the class room if he/she is more than 10 minutes late for the first hour. However, if a student is regularly late for classes he/she may not be permitted to attend classes.
- ☞ Students are forbidden to sit on the steps of any building at any time of the day.
- ☞ The corridors, the auditorium steps, library stair way, open air theatre, place around the canteen, and the library block are not meant for assemblies. Please treat them as silent zone.
- ☞ Students are not permitted to smoke in the college campus. They are liable to disciplinary action if found smoking in the campus.
- ☞ Destroying college property, furniture, lab equipment or defacing walls are serious offences. The class rooms should be kept neat and tidy.
- ☞ Ragging is a cognizable offence and those who indulge in it or encourage it will be handed over to law as per G.O Ed 122UEC 96 dated 16-01-97.
- ☞ Disciplinary action will be taken against any student found in possession of, or under the influence of drugs and alcohol.

- ☞ Bringing mobile phones to the campus is forbidden as per the order of the Department of Collegiate Education. If a student is found using a mobile phone, it will be confiscated and not returned.

DEPARTMENT OF ZOOLOGY

Research Activities of the department: Most important objective was to unravel the mechanism/s underlying the long-term female sperm storage, in the oviduct, in a viable and motile condition in Indian garden lizard, *Calotes versicolor*. Histological, histochemical, biochemical and ultrastructural studies (TEM) were adopted. Flushing using saline was collected from the oviduct (sperm storage tubules) and a protein of $\approx 50\text{KD}$ was isolated from it. It was interesting to note that both the crude and purified form of this protein retarded the motility of epididymal sperm in a reversible fashion. Presently work is in progress to characterise this protein and decode the mechanism of this retardation. The results of these studies can help us to devise better strategies for handling the modern problems in the field of reproductive biology. It may also help us carry out efforts for conservation of endangered species.
