2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The faculty members have access to e-content/e-resources available in the library for classroom teaching. In a few multimedia equipped Lecture halls the faculty can demonstrate the various multimedia content available in the digital library through virtualized CDs & DVDs. The state of the art Library Management Software provides latest information on various learning resources in the libraryThe Arts and Commerce departments have special BLOGS to interact with students. BLOGS consists of Special Articles, Objective type question bank and Notes. In our college website provision is made for a teacher to send bulk e-mail and SMS's to the students for respective classes, where teacher can interact with students in allotting assignments and discussions. The college has established a Language Lab with nine computers and a trained teacher to facilitate students to improve their accent and English Grammar.

The chalk and talk have been minimized as ICT facilities can empower a teacher to deploy all the resources available online for classroom use. During this period the students have had number of opportunities to learn from exclusive materials and teaching aids available on CDs and DVDs which can be played in classrooms. Plays/ novels taught in English classrooms have been complemented by film versions.

To enhance writing as well as communication skills it was decided to have a single project work and presentation per semester. The IBM SPSS statistical package brought by the college has helped the teachers who are doing research in Humanities, social work and commerce to convert the data they have collected to effective research presentations

This app enables fast access of attendance status by the teachers as well as students (Parents). This app is provided free of cost by Deepak Roy, Founder CEO of Genius Lead, a UK-based company (An alumnus of the college).

The faculty member and students of the Social Work department of the college would be taking time to teach school children subjects like English, basic Maths, Science. The outcome of this adoption would be to elevate the government school on part with urban/private owned schools.







Note: Karnataka Education Act, 1983- [Karnataka Act No. 1 of 1995]) Section 116: Penalty for Ragging:

- No person who is a student in an educational institution including an institution under the direct management of the University or of the Central Government shall commit ragging.
- Any person who contravenes sub-section (1) shall on conviction be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to one year or with fine which may extend to two thousand rupees or with both.
- 3. Section 2(29): "Ragging" means causing, compelling or forcing a student whether by way of a practical joke or otherwise, to do any act which detracts from human dignity or violates his person or exposes him to ridicule or to forbear from doing any lawful act, by intimidating, wrongfully restraining wrongfully confining or injuring him or by using criminal force to him or by holding out to him any threat of such intimidation, wrongful restraint wrongful confinement, injury or the use of criminal force.

contribute to Nation building. A pronounced emphasis is therefore laid on behaviour, attitude and Value enrichment. Qualities such as perseverance, honesty, integrity, tolerance, self-discipline, management strategies, problem solving techniques and amiability are essential to human character. The students are sensitized to value these virtues in their daily interaction and through various events and activities.

The College strives to develop the desired attributes in our graduates and cause a deeper understanding of oneself in the changing world. Students are encouraged to go beyond the prescribed curriculum and initiate independent research. Our mission is to build a student base that would change the society and work towards a secular world.

THE COMMON PURSUIT

Parents and Guardians

The institution holds the dream of improving the lives of students who seek admission. It is also aware of the enormous responsibility that it bears and is conscious of the expectations that are held by its stakeholders. It is in this awareness that springs the need for collaborative strategies. The students and Parents / Guardians who are the essential stakeholders that need to converge and concur on critical issues in order to build possibilities of an assured future. Hence, it calls for a strong plinth to work from. We appreciate interventions from Parents or Guardians as and when necessary and propose to build a strong partnership.

Faculty

Persons of merit and experience along with an emerging teaching fraternity hold office with a steadfast concern for Education. The faculty is enlightened about its duties and apart from dispensing regular academic responsibilities it grants assistance in counseling and mentoring. Students are encouraged to participate in Co-curricular events and offered necessary guidance by the



faculty. Exclusive attention is accorded to students who require professional counselling. Parental intervention is sought as and when the need arises. The College committed to render the quality service.

Library

The Central Library on the campus is equipped with wide-ranging Resources, both print and digital. It is a member of the N-List project supported by Inflibnet Centre, Ahmedabad which affords an access to numerous research and reviewed Journals across the streams. Books may be borrowed on all working days. A Reading Room and Reference Section is also open to students during the working hours. The adjoining section houses the UGC-Resource Network Centre enabled with Computers and Internet connectivity. Reprographic facility is also made available at the library.

Extra-curricular Activities

There is no students' union in the College. A majority of the students had suggested during the previous Orientation Programmes conducted at the beginning of the Academic Year that more sports and cultural programmes should be conducted involving all the students. Students who volunteer will constitute various committees through which these programmes will be conducted. Girl students should kindly note, that no College Function is compulsory after 5 p.m. Parents and Guardians of girl students should ensure that their children/wards do not stay out late under the pretext of College extracurricular activities.

Excursion and Picnics

Generally, the College does not organize any excursions or picnics. Students are forbidden to organize excursions or picnics, without explicit permission from the Principal. Under no circumstances, any excursion or study tours involving girl students will be permitted unless a senior lady member of the staff accompanies the group.



Sports and Games

We encourage sports and games as per the guidelines given by the Government/University. With special grants from the UGC, a state-of-the-art Indoor Stadium was established. The Director of Physical Education with the assistance of other teachers organizes the Annual Athletic Meet and a number of inter-house competitions. Selections will be made for various College teams and interested students will be trained. It is a matter of pride for all of us, that every year a sizeable number of our students are selected for the University Teams. Please note, sports and games are scheduled before or after the class hours.

Attendance

Our primary concern is the Academic growth of the students. It is mandatory for all students to attend classes regularly. As per the University Guidelines and also court directives, students who do not attend 75% of the total classes held, cannot appear for the end-semester exams. They will have to repeat the semester. Attendance is updated on a daily basis. All students should take care that they attend the classes regularly.

Dress

Ours has been a Co-education College from the very beginning. We have students from more than 20 states of India and more than 30 different countries. In spite of diverse cultures, students should respect the local customs. It is mandatory for all students to dress modestly. Whenever there is violation of dress code, students will be warned by any member of the faculty. If they repeat, they will be asked to seek admission elsewhere.

Tests and Exams

In every semester, there will be one Internal Assessment Test for 40 marks. The students will have to submit assignments for every subject. Besides



these, there will be marks for seminars, attendance, projects etc. The internal Assessment marks are counted for declaring the results of each semester. Students should take the test, assignments, seminars, academic quiz etc. held in the class seriously.

Reports

Teachers feed students attendance to the computer on daily basis. Students can check their attendance reports by swiping their smart ID cards at the computer kept in the reception. Monthly attendance reports will be displayed on the notice board and reports will be sent to the Parents / Guardians from time to time. Parents are advised to keep track of the attendance of their ward to ensure that they have the required percentage. Students who do not get the required percentage will not be permitted to appear for the end semester examination.

Identity Card

Each student is given a Smart Identity Card. All students should wear the ID card when they are inside the campus. Students have to swipe the ID card at the machine installed at every entrance, every time they come in or go out. The security personnel at each gate have been asked to monitor this and report to the Principal if any student refuses to swipe. Please cooperate by wearing the ID card. This is the only way to curb anti-social elements from entering the College campus.

Scholarships and Freeship

Students who wish to claim Scholarships and Freeship under categories such as SC/ST, minorities, differently abled and other reserved categories can avail information at a section dedicated to related issues at the office. Applications will be forwarded by the College office to the concerned Government Departments. Scholarship/Freeship amount will be transferred



directly to the SB account of the student by the respective Government Departments.

Certificates

Students should apply for various certificates like Bonafide Certificate, Study Certificate, T.C etc. in the prescribed form available in the office. Certificates will be issued within three working days. Please do not demand for these certificates on the same day you submit the application.

Vehicles

Students who bring two wheelers to the College should pay the prescribed fee to the College office and obtain a pass to park the vehicle in the Cycle! Scooter stand. Students should not park their vehicle in the parking space set apart for the Staff. The responsibility of the College ceases one hour after the last period on a working day. Vehicles not collected will be handed over to the police. Please do not park vehicles outside the gate. If parked, the Traffic Police will be asked to clear them.

OTHER PROGRAMMES IN THE COLLEGE

Orientation Programmes

At the beginning of the Academic Year, Orientation Programmes are conducted for the freshers to expose them to the functioning of the College and also motivate them to participate in various activities.

Campus Ministry

To foster the faith formation of the Catholic students, the College offers the following activities: Jesus Youth Group, Bible Study Group and AICUF. The members of these groups meet once a week. These meetings are geared towards developing and strengthening Christian ideals, leadership and deepen their spirituality.



Eucharistic Celebration

At the beginning of each year an Inaugural Mass is celebrated. Besides Eucharistic celebrations on various occasions, a Thanksgiving Mass is also offered at the end of the Academic Year.

The Annual Retreat

Opportunities are provided for Catholic students to make a Retreat during the course of the academic year. All Catholic students are expected to attend the Retreat.

Religious Instruction Classes

All Catholic students should attend the religious instruction classes conducted regularly.

COLLEGE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Whenever many individuals live together, discipline is necessary and this is especially true of an institution for the education of youth. This discipline is formative and not repressive. It enables the student to practice and develop self discipline which is essential for a well-ordered and successful life. St. Philomena's College wants students to adhere to all Rules and Regulations intended to benefit the institution as well as the individual student.

- Every student must wear the identity card while on campus and produce it whenever any member of the Staff/ Official of the College demands.
- Regular attendance to classes is compulsory. As per University Regulations, 75% attendance is compulsory otherwise; students cannot appear for the end semester Examinations. Any loss of attendance cannot be made up by producing a Medical Certificate.
- Students not having 75% attendance are not eligible for any scholarship and if availed at the beginning of the academic year should return the same.



- 4. The College working hours is from 9.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. The first siren is given 5 minutes prior to the start of classes. When the students hear the first siren, they should quickly move towards their respective classrooms and be in their class rooms before the second siren. Without the Teacher's permission, students are not permitted to leave the class room.
- Students must observe punctuality. Late comers will not be allowed to enter the classes without a note from the Principal. However, if a student is regularly late for classes he/ she may not be permitted to attend classes.
- If a concerned teacher is on leave, students should go to the library.They should not crowd on the corridors during class hours or otherwise.
- 7. The corridors, auditorium steps, library stair way, open air theatre, place around the canteen, and the library block are treated as silent zones and students are not permitted to assemble in these silent zones. The College has provided a good number of stone benches in the campus for the student to sit on during their free time and sitting on the steps of any building at any time of the day is not permitted.
- 8. The College seriously takes note of misbehavior, insubordination, habitual tardiness, instigating indiscipline by violence, groupism, class clashes, irregular work habits, un-becoming language or conduct, obscenity in word or deed, carrying weapons or firecrackers are punishable by fine, suspension or dismissal. The College is declared an alcohol, smoking and drug free area and offenders face dismissal.
- Destroying College property, furniture, lab equipment or defacing walls
 are serious offences. The class rooms should be kept neat and tidy.
 Writing and drawing on the benches and desks is strictly prohibited.
- 10. Misbehavior outside the College affects the reputation of the College



- and has an impact on the students inside. The College reserves the right to take such action as necessary and make such rules as are necessary in the interest of general student community.
- 11. Students are expected to conduct themselves according to the College decorum and shall be dressed neatly and decently and are not expected to wear T-Shirts, Jeans Pant and Short Tops in the College campus.
- 12. No outdoor games are allowed during class hours. No picnics or excursions can be organized or any type of contributions / subscriptions made without the explicit permission of the Management / Principal.
- 13. Students should not bring any of their friends to the College campus without the prior permission of the Principal. As a rule if a person other than the student is found inside the College campus he/she will be handed over to the police.
- 14.Ragging is a cognizable offence. Any involvement in ragging, even of the mildest type entails immediate suspension and on enquiry, if found guilty, dismissal from the College.
- 15. Kindly note that as per the Notifications from UGC and University of Mysore, usage of mobile phones in the College campus is banned. Many Parents plead that they live far away from Mysuru and desire to speak to their wards in order to be assured of their well being. While we understand parental anxiety, we have to abide by the various circulars issued from time to time on the use of mobiles. Please also note that, students habitually using mobile phone tend to carry them into the Examination Hall which may result in their exam being cancelled. We assure you that, emergency calls made to the College office, Rector, Principal and Wardens will always be noted and urgent information will be communicated to the students. If a student is found using a mobile phone, it will be confiscated and will not be returned.



- Basic amenities are provided for students. Once admitted do not compare our College with others and demand for more amenities.
- We respect all Religions. No special privileges on religious grounds will be entertained.
- 18. Those who wish to leave the College for any reason will be given a TC only on payment of fees for the remaining semesters and clearing any other dues. Such students have to return any scholarship, stipend or financial assistance given.
- 19. Parents / Guardians are requested to visit the College and enquire about the progress of their child / ward in the Internal Assessment Test and the Attendance.
- 20. Students should park their vehicles in the allotted place only.
- Students who do not live with their parents or in the College Hostel are required to inform the Principal about the details of their place of residence.
- 22. No student is permitted to take part in agitations directed against the lawful authority of the Government. Membership of clubs or associations outside the campus and participation in public movements without permission is undesirable. Students are not allowed to collect donation from the public for any purpose.
- 23. College fees are to be paid within 2 weeks of the reopening of semester classes. A late fee of Rs.500 is payable after that. If fees are not paid within 4 weeks after reopening, the name of the student will be struck off from the rolls.
- 24. Tuition and other fees once paid will not be refunded.
- 25. A student having shortage of attendance in one or more subjects will have to repeat the whole semester and such students will not be permitted to take admission to the next semester.



26. The Change of Permanent Residential Address must be notified to the College office.

- 27. Transfer of admissions is permissible only at the level of III and V semesters for the students of other universities provided they have passed all the subjects of previous semesters as the case may be. They will be issued final marks card without declaring a class and are not eligible for ranking. They shall complete the course as per the regulation governing the maximum duration (Six years for UG and Four years for PG).
- 28. Option to change a language/ subject is exercisable only once within the first four weeks from the date of commencement of the first semester on payment of fee prescribed by the College. A student may change II language during the second semester on payment of fee prescribed by the College, on condition, the student appears for the first semester examination of that subject. The Internal Assessment marks for that subject will be calculated on the basis of the marks obtained in the end semester examination. Whenever a change in a subject is permitted, the attendance in the changed subject shall be calculated by taking into consideration the attendance in the previous subject opted by the student.
- 29. A student shall be considered to have satisfied the requirement of attendance for a semester if he/she attends not less than 75% of the number of classes actually held up to the end of the semester in each subject. If a student represents the College/University/ State/ Nation in sports, NCC/ NSS/ Cultural or any other officially sponsored activities he/she may be permitted to claim attendance for actual number of hours/ days participated based on the recommendation of the teacher concerned. If a student is selected to participate in national level events such as Republic Day Parade etc., he/she may be permitted to claim attendance



for actual number of days participated based on the recommendation of the teacher concerned.

STUDENTS PLEASE NOTE

- Breaking the above rules will result in immediate suspension and if found guilty, after due inquiry will be dismissed from the College. The College, though not responsible for the conduct of the students outside the campus will take cognizance of any serious misconduct.
- Please understand that ours is a shared task in extending the bounds of your knowledge and in creating in you a broad-minded vision of life.
- 3. We welcome you to the College with the confidence that you will live up to the ideals of St. Philomena's College and co-operate fully with the teaching / non-teaching staff and the authorities of the College in the ongoing process of your education.

LIBRARY MEMBERSHIP AND BOOK BORROWING PROCEDURE

- 1. A membership card must be applied for along with two passport size photographs. Two Borrowers card are given to a member. These cards are not transferable. The students can borrow two books at a time for which he/she is held responsible. The books should be returned within 7 days. After 7 days, a late fee of Rs. 1/- per day per book will be collected. In case of damage or loss, the member shall be required to replace it or pay double the cost. Loss of Borrower Card shall be intimated to the Librarian in writing. Duplicate card will be issued at a cost of Rs.30/- per card after verification. To obtain "No Due Certificate", members should return all books borrowed, pay over-due charges if any and surrender the borrowers card to the Library.
- Strict silence must be observed in the library, reading room and the corridors leading to the library. Personal belongings like bags, books,



over coats, mobile, umbrella and caps etc. are not allowed inside the library. Writing and drawing on the reading tables is strictly prohibited.

A NOTE TO PARENTS / GUARDIANS

- We are happy that you have admitted your child / ward in our care. To
 ensure best results, we request you to cooperate with the College.
 Kindly emphasize the importance of regular study habits at home or in
 the hostel. We would like your child / ward to be:
 - Regular and on time to classes and lab work as teachers may not admit late comers
 - b) Well organized in their study habits and submit assignments/records /project reports on time.
 - Well prepared for each theory I A test and for other IA component tests.
 - Meet the concerned teachers regularly outside class and clarify doubts.
 - e) When absent, report to the concerned teacher when they come for the next class.
 - f) Dressed neatly and decently and are not expected to wear T Shirts, Jean Pants and Short Tops in the College campus
 - g) Your encouragement will go a long way in improving results.
- 2. The University of Mysore to which the College is affiliated insists 75% attendance. Discourage your child / ward from being absent. When illness is more than 3 days, kindly inform the Principal in writing. However, loss of attendance cannot be made up by producing a Medical Certificate. Students who take ill inside the campus will be referred to St. Joseph's Hospital for treatment and/or hospitalization if necessary.
- 3. Students will be informed about their attendance position periodically



by the College so that the students will be cautioned to make up for the shortage.

STUDENTS EVALUATION / EXAMINATION FOR UG COURSES

The UG courses in the College are credit based except that of B.Com, BBA, BCA and BSW which are CBCS pattern. All the PG courses are CBCS pattern. One hour of teaching per week for 16/18 weeks is considered as one credit and two hours of tutorials / practical / project are considered as one credit.

Internal Assessment (IA):

- The Internal Assessment commonly known as continuous assessment
 will be carried out as per the regulations mentioned below. A student
 will be permitted to take the end semester examination only if he/she
 has completed the continuous assessment requirements. The internal
 assessment marks for theory shall be based on one test, assignments/
 seminar/ project and class participation (Class Attendance). The test
 shall be of 90 minutes duration and will be field during the 8th week of
 the semester.
- For practical papers, in addition to one IA test, will have other compagents
 as prescribed for the course. For Internship/Industrial visit/Fraject IA
 components will be as prescribed for the course.
- There shall be no minimum for internal assessment (IA) marks and shall remain as a fixed component. A student who has failed or rejected the result shall retain the internal assessment marks and it will be carried forward as IA marks for the subsequent appearances.
- The theory papers without practical carrying 100 marks will have 03
 hours of end semester theory examination for 80 marks and 20 marks
 for internal assessment (IA) and subjects with practical (except BCA &



BTHM) will have 03 hours of end semester theory examination for 60/80 marks and 10/20 marks for internal assessment (IA). IA marks for theory papers are awarded as follows and are reduced to 10/20. Fractional marks if any will be rounded off to the next higher digit.

- There shall be no provision for improvement of IA marks in theory and practical subjects.
- 6. Minimum for a Pass: No student will be declared to have passed the Semester Examination unless he/she obtains not less than 40% marks including internal assessment in theory and practical with a minimum of 30% marks in the end semester written examinations (theory and practical separately) without IA marks.
- 7. A student who appears for both theory and practical end semester examinations together and if fails in theory but gets a minimum of 30% in practical paper and 40% including IA marks will be exempted from end semester practical examination. The marks scored in the exempted practical will be carried to the subsequent appearances of the theory examinations of that paper. Students who fail in practical and get pass marks in theory will be declared as failed in both theory and practical. The benefit of practical exemption is not extended to the students who do not appear for theory and practical end semester examination together.



- A student who fails in any subject shall appear only for that subject at any subsequent regular/supplementary examination within double the duration of the course. The student must obtain the minimum marks for a pass in that subject (Theory and Practical separately).
- NCL (Not completed lower examinations): The results of the students
 who pass in the VI semester examination but not the lower semester
 examinations shall be declared as NCL. Such students will be eligible
 for the degree, only after clearing all the lower semester examinations.
- 10. Carry over: There will not be any restrictions for promotion from odd semester to even semester, provided the student has fulfilled the attendance requirements
- 11. Provision for Drop Outs: Such of those students who have discontinued the course/ failed to take admission to the next semester, shall get admitted to the concerned semester in the immediate next academic year only. This provision is available to a student only two times in the entire duration of the course.
- 12. Classification of successful students: The results of successful students at the end of VI semester will be classified on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in all 6 semesters. Declaration of class on the basis of percentage of Aggregate Marks.
- 13. First Class with Distinction 75% and above
- 14. First Class more than 60% but less than 75%
- 15. Second Class more than 50% but less than 60%
- 16. Pass Class more than 40% but Less than 50%
- Declaration of Rank: Only those students who pass all the semester examinations in the first attempt are eligible for Ranks, provided they



secure 60% and above marks. Migrated and repeater students (including those who seek improvement) shall not be eligible for Rank. Ranks shall be declared for the number of persons equal to 10% of the total number of students appearing for any final semester examination (fractions being rounded off to the nearest integer as per convention), subject to a minimum of 1 and maximum of 10. (Provided there were at least five students registered for the examination). Rank will be declared on the basis of the aggregate of the total marks secured by a student in all the semesters. Ranks will be given from one onwards in the descending order of the total marks obtained in all the examinations considered for the purpose. In case of tie, the student who secures marks without grace or less grace is preferred for ranking/awarding Prizes / Medals . If more than one person is bracketed with the same marks, all of them will get the same rank which is the highest possible rank for them. Ex: If two persons are bracketed with the same marks for top position, both will get the same rank (Rank - 1) and so on. Rank certificate will be issued only up to Rank - 10.A student who passes the semester examinations in parts is eligible for only class and not for ranking.

18. Rejection of Results: A student may be permitted to reject the result of the whole examination of any semester. Rejection of result paperwise /subjectwise is not be permitted. A student who has rejected the result will appear for the examinations conducted immediately following Regular / Supplementary Examination of the semester concerned. The rejection will be exercised only once in each semester and the rejection once exercised cannot be revoked. A student who rejects the result is eligible for only class and not Ranking. Application for rejection along with the payment of the prescribed fee shall be submitted to the Examination Office together with the original statement of marks within 30 days from the date of publication of the result.



- 19. Answer Script Seeing & Retotaling of Marks: Application to see and retotaling of marks along with the payment of the prescribed fee shall be submitted to the Controller together with the original statement of marks within 15 days from the date of publication of the result. Application submitted after 15 days will not be considered. The students shall apply to see & retotal their answer script only. The actual retotaled marks will only be considered and a revised marks statement shall be issued to the student.
- 20. Revaluation of Answer Scripts: Application for revaluation of the answer scripts along with the payment of the prescribed fee shall be submitted to the Controller together with the original statement of marks within 15 days from the date of publication of the result. Application submitted after 15 days will not be considered. The average marks of the two valuations will be considered as marks secured by the student.
- 21. If the difference between the marks awarded by the two examiners is more than 15% of the maximum marks of that paper, then the paper will be sent for third valuation. The average of the marks of nearest two valuations will be considered as marks secured by the student. However, if one of the three marks falls exactly midway between the other two, then the higher two marks will be taken for averaging.
- 22. Seeing & Revaluation of Answer Script: Seeing & Revaluation of answer script shall be applied together. Revaluation of answer script after seeing is not allowed.

STUDENTS EVALUATION / EXAMINATION FOR PG COURSES

The Evaluation / Examination guidelines are given in the respective syllabus. Students are requested to go through and any doubt can be cleared from the teachers of the respective departments.
